College Career and Military Readiness (CCMR) is about preparing students for life after graduation. It is made up of curriculum, resources, programs and activities that give students the tools they need to enter college or the workforce and begin a career.

BRCS offers a curriculum with an emphasis on Career and Technology Education (CTE) to prepare students for the workforce or secondary education, based largely on specific student interest. BRCS has a goal of 75% of all students in grades 9-12 participating in the CTE program.

Specifically, BRCS offers six career clusters that focus on specific areas of interest including:

Business, Marketing, and Finance

- Accounting and Financial Services Program of Study

Agriculture, Food, and Natural Resources

- Environmental and Natural Resources Program of Study

Law and Public Service

- Government and Public Administration

Arts, AudioVisual Technology and Communication

- Digital Communications

Health Science

- Health Informatics

- Law Enforcement

BRCS has partnered with Hill College to allow students to receive both High School and College Credit simultaneously.

BRCS administers the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) annually.
